CHILD ABUSE – IT'S EVERYBODY'S PROBLEM

This class provides critical information on what signs to expect from a child who is a victim of abuse, the causes/risk factors of child abuse and neglect that occurs in a home, and how to properly make a report of abuse to DCS and the mandated reporting guidelines in Arizona (Offered in English and Spanish).

ALTERNATIVES TO SPANKING

Parents learn positive guidance techniques and non-violent means to discipline young children. This class offers many examples and alternative methods that can be used to deter negative behavior and build positive outcomes for the child(ren) and family.

COMMUNICATING WITH RESPECT

Communicating with children can sometimes feel challenging. The key for parents and caregivers is to communicate thoughts and feelings in a manner that does not purposefully hurt them. This class offers strategies and tips to improve communication with children and parents/caregivers which helps to build family functioning.

Here are 10 reasons to prevent child maltreatment before it hurts children and communities:

- 1 Child maltreatment can be **fatal**.
- 2 Child maltreatment can stymie a child's normal **growth and development**.
- 3 Child maltreatment is **costly** for many social institutions.
- 4 Child maltreatment costs continue to **multiply** over time.
- 5 Child maltreatment victims may **repeat the violent acts** that they experienced.
- 6 Treatment services, while critical, are often **ineffective** in permanently altering parental behaviors.
- 7 Prevention programs targeted at parents before they become abusive or neglectful **reduce** the likelihood for future maltreatment.
- 8 Prevention programs targeted at children can **improve a child's awareness** of how best to avoid child maltreatment and other unsafe practices.
- 9 Child abuse prevention efforts serve as a way to **combat other social problems** of concern to the public and to policy makers.
- 10 Child abuse prevention creates a more compassionate society, one which places a **high value on the welfare of children**.

Are Safe Exchange Zones Safe For Custody Exchanges?

Casa de los Niños Supervised Visitation Program (CDLN SV Program) is a member of the **Supervised Visitation Network (SVN)**, a membership organization of professionals who provide supervised visitation and access services to families. Casa de los Niños Supervised Visitation Program and the Supervised Visitation Network are concerned about the use of "Safe Exchange Zones" at police department parking lots for custody exchanges. The original intent of the "Safe Exchange Zones" was to provide a safe place for online transactions like Craigslist, but increasingly they are being suggested as custody exchange locations as well.



While this may seem like a good idea, if you are concerned about your safety when exchanging your children with another parent, this does NOT offer sufficient security measures to minimize or prevent physical or verbal assaults common in high-conflict divorces. In fact, there have been violent—and even fatal—incidents that have occurred during custody exchanges in front of police stations.

The Casa de los Niños Supervised Visitation Program provides safe, supervised exchanges of children in custody cases that minimize the chances of violence by keeping parties separate during the provision of service, enforcing staggered arrival times to prevent stalking and other altercations, conducting thorough intakes of all parties to understand the issues present with each family, and other measures that have proven to be effective. An unmanned area with security cameras only helps law enforcement capture perpetrators after tragedies have occurred and does nothing to prevent children from witnessing highly-charged emotional conflicts that commonly occur during exchanges. SVN and the CDLN SV program understand the unique emotional and physical safety risks that require careful preparation and training of those providing supervised exchanges.

Casa de los Niños Supervised Visitation Program is an accredited provider as certified by the Council on Accreditation as well as a service provider for the Pima County Superior Court and follows the SVN published minimum standards that address all aspects of the provision of services, including a section on providing safety and security for all participants. These standards are posted at www.svnworldwide.org.

We're About Prevention

During Child Abuse Prevention Month, we share some thoughts from our prevention program leadership teams.

NURSE-FAMILY PARTNERSHIP

When preparing to be a parent for the first time, there is much change and many questions to be answered. Nurse-Family Partnership (NFP) Nurse Home Visitors (NHVs) are specially trained, registered nurses

who bring clinical expertise and education to new parents who are navigating challenges and risks. Our team of NHVs provide regularly-scheduled home visits from early pregnancy until the child's second birthday. NFP program goals are to improve and support pregnancy outcomes, the child's health and development, and the client's self-sufficiency. NFP NHVs do not replace obstetricians, midwives, or pediatricians; they enhance and provide guidance beyond the medical provider's office where time can be limited. NFP NHVs develop a therapeutic relationship with each client and build bridges to champion clients' strengths, using them to address risk factors as assessed by the NHV. By using the nursing process, NHVs create a plan of care and provide nursing interventions, education, support, and resources that include but are not limited to: childbirth; mental health; client's blood pressure and weight gain throughout pregnancy; family planning; nutrition; medication education; breastfeeding, formula feeding, and introduction of solids; infant growth, growth curves, developmental milestones and brain development; injury prevention and personal safety; and infection prevention.

"The strength of Nurse-Family Partnership lies in the therapeutic relationship between the client and her nurse home visitor. This allows the nurse to tailor the program to each individual client's strengths, challenges, needs, goals, and dreams. We see impactful outcomes because our clients trust their nurse home visitors, and our nurse home visitors take the time to listen to their clients, assess need, and develop individualized nursing plans of care."


